For Didier Acevedo, CFA, joining the CFA Society of Los Angeles was a natural progression after experiencing the value of local societies in Boston and Chicago. He has been active in volunteering for other organizations like the University of Chicago Booth School of Business both as an alumnus and while he was an MBA student (from student tour guide to vice president of the alumni group). Acevedo says, "In general, I think there is value in giving back and being engaged in the communities we represent."
